We had an excellent Budget Meeting on Saturday June 24<sup>th</sup>, thanks to the painstaking preparations of Lion Treasurer Al. I won't go into the details but this is a good place to let you know about the implications on the Club for the coming Lions year.



We all wanted to arrive at a balanced budget, that is a budget that does not draw further funds from our bank balances and hopefully adds to them. Therefore, our donations will be limited to headcount-based the charities like Canine Companions and Lions Eye Foundation, plus a few that address our core values (sight, hunger, education). We reviewed a number of suggestions for new fundraisers but rejected all on the basis of risk/reward imbalance. So, we will rely on Register of Voters, Crab Feed and (hopefully) a revitalized golf tournament to provide our income up to July

2024. We realize that the Crab Feed particularly will need an extensive number of volunteers and we regretfully decided not to rely on Leos this year. I took an action to connect with the Boy/Girl Scouts movement to establish a mutually beneficial relationship. This worked extremely well at my last Club in Sonoma County. Lion Jennifer made an excellent suggestion to hold the golf tournament on a Friday, making it easier for the workers to attend. Apparently, this would not involve additional cost.

Our next event will be the Summer BBQ to be held at The Villages on July  $22^{nd}$ , at the Gazebo, a delightful, shaded location overlooking the golf course and meadow. It will be a Pot Luck for side dishes and BYO flat wear; all else will be provided. I look forward to seeing you there.



As our District has adopted Vision Clinic as a District project, I will be free to focus 100% on Cupertino DeAnza this coming year and I plan to work with Lion Liang on Membership and to do a full visitation program with your help.

I look forward to an exciting year and rely on you all to do your best for Lions.

#### **Golf Tournament Cancelled** by LNoone

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The DeAnza Lions Charity checking account is now just over \$6,000.00. We do have just over \$20,000.00 in a Charity savings account and CD. So currently, approximately \$27,000.00 is available for disbursement.

The Budget Committee has met and their work is currently being prepared for approval by the Board of Directors. To say that these are troubling times may be a slight understatement. Our ability to serve the people in need has been curbed by the pandemic and a few other factors. We are optimistic that we will have a successful Crab Feed and are deep in the decision process for a Golf Classic.

The Annual Charitable Giving that we have been able to maintain over the past eight years may be significantly curtailed this year and into the future. We do have a way to raise significant funds through the Registrar of Voters election process **if** we can get the Club volunteers needed. There will be more about this election-time fundraising soon.

### Cupertino Earth Day by DZimdahl

Like last year, Earth Day Festival 2023 in Cupertino was announced early in the year and Lion Joan reserved two adjacent spaces for the Cupertino DeAnza Lions Club early on, so even though she had to miss the event, the Club was set up to be very well represented.

When I got to our spots before 9:00am, the canopies for Lions (the 'big' one and a smaller one) were already up and Lion Ray was there guarding our two posts. He and dozens of young kids helped to unload my car.

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The location of our tables could not have been better: the tables were facing West, we had the big tent with the side cover in the East, and the Brag Board shielding us from the midday sun in the South. There was nobody on our left side and on the right side we had the Santa Clara Master Gardeners. Almost opposite were the 2 food trucks and the ice cream station, which was nice; there were no overwhelming smells, just a whiff of cinnamon from the Waffle truck wafting our way once in a while.

Ray had brought another table and two additional chairs from storage which was great. He helped to put Joan's tablecloths on all 3 tables and put up the Brag Board. Lion Barb joined us at 9:30 and she sent Ray home, as we thought we could handle everything from there.

I had brought around 350 packets of extra seeds ("Free handouts") and photos of our sunflowers at the Camp plus the display of sunflowers we had grown in the greenhouse in the last 6 weeks.



Barb and I peeled off more sunflower seeds when the first visitors came by shortly before 11:00am. By that time, Lion Sue had joined us and she was happy to help people seed sunflowers using the screened soil and the already-peeled sunflower seeds. Many admired the displays and were keen on taking some of the seed packages. Most people were pleasant and polite; they asked about the plantings, were curious about the seeds and all were pleased to be able to plant their seeds and take them home.

Young and old were happily seeding the sunflowers with the help of Sue and volunteer Carol, who arrived before noon time. One older gentleman came by and raved about the sunflowers he had gotten last year; they had grown to 6 feet tall, he marveled. We ran out of most seed packets by 1:00pm. Basil, Cilantro and Nasturtiums were in high demand – I could have brought at least 50 more packets of each (and we do still have a lot of Cilantro seeds). Carol pulled more sunflowers from the chaff, and Barb made more sunflower seed packages which were also going like hot cakes.

Around 2:30pm, Lion Ray came back with Lions Charlie and Eli to pick up the Lions items, and together with Carol and Sue, he and Charlie helped with the packing up of most of my stuff.

Not many people were interested in the Lions Club per se, probably because that table was not 'manned'; but many stopped for a wee chat and were happy to get those seed packets. We now have a few email addresses; one from a lady who asked if we would like to have HS students as volunteers out at the garden. I also talked with the Master Gardeners and gave them my email address to receive their event calendar and info regarding their teaching classes. I asked them if they had met Joan at their garden event a couple of weeks ago, but they did not recognize the name.

It was a great event with lovely, helpful volunteers at an ideal location. The super pre-work and instructions from Joan were an enormous help. I would call the Cupertino Earth Day quite a successful event!



#### Lions Vision Clinic by JSmith

On Sunday, April 23<sup>rd</sup> at 8:00am, 10 optometrists and 70 other volunteers (mostly Lions) gathered at St. John Vianney Community Center to run a Vision Clinic, targeting uninsured patients. Nine hours later 350 patients had passed through the door, all

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of whom received a detailed eye exam and eye glasses if they needed them.



We had assistance from Lions all around Silicon Valley, Aptos and Santa Cruz and we saw patients whose first language was Spanish or Vietnamese, as well as English. 3000 leaflets had been distributed to soup kitchens, shelters, churches, schools, Catholic Charities, the Salvation Army and the Vietnamese Service Center.

Most of the glasses were issued from the Lions inventory, normally housed in Vallejo and brought down for the day. More unusual prescriptions were ordered online from manufacturer Zenni who generously provided coupons as the clinic was completely free of charge. All orders were delivered within 10 days.



We saw patients of all ages; several children were fitted with glasses for the first time.

We had translators on hand to assist our Spanishand Vietnamese-speaking patients.

There were three organizations on hand supplying ancillary services:

- Lions Eye Foundation received 17 referrals for patients who needed ongoing treatment.
- Vista Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired attended to assist those with little or no vision.
- San Jose/Santa Clara County Library was set up to present their Adult Tutoring service.



Food for volunteers was available all day, provided by local grocery stores and restaurants, particularly Panera Bread, and was served by volunteer Lions.

Unfortunately, about 150 registrations had to be denied as the clinic was over-subscribed. There will be a similar event hosted by the Mexican Consulate on Saturday, 7 October.

Subsequently, at their annual convention, Lions District 4C-6 adopted Vision Clinics as a District project to enable clubs to work together on repeat events.

We all have been navigating our paths to and from the garden area either through the immense construction zones or by climbing up the steps in the amphitheater and on over lowered fences. Almost nothing remains from the formerly peaceful quiet camp, especially the stillness during the pandemic, but we have been assured that everything will be beautiful when finished around the end of May. "We'll see"!



We are still dreaming about getting shade cloths, one spanning the whole garden and another one covering the greenhouse, remembering the excessive heat from last year.

Joan will be running the garden and greenhouse operations mostly by herself during June and at the beginning of July, but our new volunteer, Julie, will become an asset, like our loyal friend Carol, who has been helping once a week with harvesting and watering.

Speaking of harvest, in May we more than doubled our April harvest, but wait for the tomatoes,

zucchini, cucumbers, peppers and eggplants coming later in summer!

# A Blast from the Past: CDAL History in print

#### and at Camp By AKnox

In 1969 Lion George Fernandez of the Cupertino Host Lions led the formation of the DeAnza Lions Club. The Club was chartered by Lions Clubs International in 1969 but, became a California 501c4 Non-Profit Public Benefit Corporation in 1980. We are known officially as the Lions Club of DeAnza Corporation.

Our 1984-1985 Club budget was \$2,920.00 in revenue and \$3,565.00 in expense, showing a deficit of \$645.00. Of those expenditures \$2,325.00 went directly to charity. That's an admirable 65% of revenue. Half of that revenue came from dues and the ever-present tail twister fines. The other revenue came from a booth at the De Anza College Flea Market. Our balance sheet was a meager \$1,750.00. Our charitable expenditures were interesting, showing funds to our Public Service Committee, Crippled Children's camp (now Camp Via Services/AbilityPath), food baskets to help the needy, Patriotism Day, the Tournament of Bands, Alcohol and Drug Awareness, Diabetes Awareness, the Speech Contest, Service Above Self (High School Scholarships) and Variety Audio (audio recordings for the blind).



Also, during the 1984-85 period, Lion Dick Shuster put out a monthly newsletter called "Here's DeAnza." Here is quote from the September 27, 1984 edition of Here's DeAnza, "Lions Fred Burr, Rocky Vachon, Brian Fitzgerald, Joe Gilbert, Jim Gould, Dick Schuster, Bob Moorman, and Al Knox conspired to put some polish on our Horse Corral and Petting Zoo Project at Camp Costanoan on the 15<sup>th</sup> of September. These eight Lions did us proud as they flexed their muscles moving 16 tons of crushed rock to the sheep and goat pen and the horse corral. They also reworked the water trough in the horse corral. The sheep, goats and horses are all reported to having been a lot more active on their improved floors. It is amazing what can be accomplished when an inspired and dedicated group of Lions attack a project."

How does the foregoing happen when you only have twenty-one members? Here's DeAnza reported a DeAnza Lions weekly Thursday meeting attendance record at an astounding ninety per-cent. And the Annual Student Speaker Contest for February 1985 was: "TELEVISION – MASTER OR SERVANT." That's the story Fellow Lions, a single year captioned in the 54-year history of the Cupertino DeAnza Lions Club. <u>"WE SERVE."</u>



#### **Op-Ed, Lions Charity Budget 2023-24**

This piece was developed by Lion NEliason in collaboration with Past President Lion JLudlum and "The Lions Roar" Editor Lion LNoone. As you all know, Lion Al Knox would like to retire as Club Treasurer. We owe a great debt of gratitude to Al for his countless hours and dedication while directing and navigating an increasingly complex set of rules and regulations to keep our Club's budget and finances operating and legal, especially during the pandemic years. For your service, Al, the Cupertino DeAnza Lions (CDAL) will always be grateful.

We now have a dilemma. Budget-wise, our Club faces a real challenge.

Because of CDAL members' work and commitment, in recent years we have been able to deliver over \$40,000 a year in charitable goods and funds. These goods and funds have gone to support international, national, state and local charitable causes, including disaster relief, improving health and living conditions and fighting hunger. Locally, we help the disadvantaged, people with disabilities and others as we try to help those in need to live better lives.

Unfortunately, largely due to the pandemic, we have spent down most of the profits from our fundraising events. In addition, we cancelled our annual charity golf tournaments 2023 and 2024 due to lack of golfer (member) participation; historically the tournament has been a source of good revenue.

Here is the issue: Ideally, we would like to continue supporting a generous, charitable budget (similar to the history of ~\$40,000 annual

donations). Many causes and non-profit entities have come to rely on our DeAnza Lions Charities support. There are a number of possible solutions to achieve this goal. All of them, however, require us as members to become more active and involved in these fundraising events.

Below are some considerations:

- Our Crab Feed could be far more profitable if we each made a commitment to get more diners to the event. We also need twice as many volunteers at the Crab Feed as we had in February 2023. Let us all attend *and* help work the event. Many Lions make lighter work for everyone volunteering.
- 2. The same is true for the Thanksgiving Food Drive. We need a commitment from our members and volunteers to participate and help work the event.
- 3. There are many civic and corporate grants available to service clubs. Many include grant event opportunities requiring volunteer worker participation to qualify for financing. In the past, CDAL has received grant funding from LCIF, the City of Cupertino, the Sobrato Foundation and the Apple Benevity Fund, among others. We could form a Club Finance MEMBER Committee to find sources and apply for funding.
- 4. Our Club's involvement in supporting the election events through the Registrar of Voters (ROV) has emerged as a great success and income grows with each election. When we volunteer to assist with the many voting tasks, the participating CDAL volunteer receives a stipend for every shift; these stipends have historically then been donated by the member volunteers to the Club. Then the Club has donated the funds to our charity account. The more shifts we fill, the more revenue we bring into the Club. Increasing support for this event is a no brainer. It requires no Personal or Club financial investment; it simply requires "Sweat Equity" (your time). You can choose between day, evening and weekend shifts and various numbers of hours during each shift. These shifts allow you to choose how you want to work volunteering for the ROV into your schedule.

Conclusion: What we need from all fellow Lions, is a much larger commitment from ALL members to support our fundraising and volunteer endeavors. As stated earlier: Many Lions make lighter work for all involved. Remember our Motto: WE SERVE.
