President John's jottings for the Cupertino DeAnza Lions Vision Clinic

Although our first vision clinic in the District is not strictly in the 2023–2024 Lions Year, it was held last April after our previous Charter Night. I am happy to report that DeAnza's sponsorship resulted in 3 more vison clinics being held locally and a total of over 800 patients served. I'm grateful to the Club for stepping up and sponsoring and to members who worked hard to make it a success.

Food Drive

November 2023 was another successful Food Drive as we provided food to 172 families and two carloads of food to the Watsonville farmworkers. Public response was a little down on previous events but we got by without seriously hemorrhaging the budget. It was great to see all the usual characters turning out to help.

Successful Crab Feed

Six weeks ago we held our Crab Feed and managed to make a profit of over \$6K. It was also

very successful in terms of customer satisfaction. I went around to every table during the 1st seating and received only glowing reports, especially about table service (thank you, Leo's) and crab quality. Kudos to Lions Carl and Jenni for their leadership. Again, we had a good turnout from Club members and volunteers from other Lions Clubs.

Register of Voters

During the past year DeAnza has participated in both elections, the last one just a couple of weeks ago. This is a very lucrative activity involving a lot of time but not much effort, except for Lions Barb and Al, who do the organization and even opened their home to be the Logistics and Supply Center last time. Many thanks to them for driving this project which resulted in an income of many thousands of dollars, some of which funds the Admin account, but mostly benefits our charities.



Camp Via West

Lion Joan and Lion Dagi have spent half a lifetime tirelessly servicing the garden and harvesting produce. I know they are working hard to get the management of the camp to take responsibility so that they can recover some leisure time again. Also, a big shout out to Joan's husband Wayne for his efforts in clearing the ground of those awful thistles. And this guy is not even a Lion! Great job, Wayne.

Social Media

We have another non-Lion volunteer who has brought DeAnza into the 21st century by spearheading our social media endeavors. She has set up accounts on Facebook and Instagram, presented to us on how to maximize benefits of social media, held a workshop on how to set up our own accounts and kept both accounts updated with current information. Anjali, we hope you accept our thanks for all of your efforts.

Club Awards

Our vibrant Club has received several awards due to our wide-ranging activities. In addition to an award made at the recent MD-4 for our support of LCIF, we were also recognized by Camp Via West in front of several hundred donors at their Annual Dinner. The Vision Clinic resulted in Project of the Year Award from last year's DG, Melinda Blaza and finally we were awarded the Club Excellence Award at the last Cabinet Meeting, due to efforts by our Secretary, Barb Knox.



Club Bulletin

Lion Leslye has put in sterling service documenting the Club's achievements and history. I believe this a vital glue to keep the Club and our customers informed. We have made the Lions Roar available to our website and social media accounts. Thanks, Leslye.

Other Support

In addition, Club members have supported other district and club initiatives, including Eyeglass Cleaning, Omar's Dream Run, Rise Against Hunger,

the AJ Robinson health screening facility and regular deliveries of food, household supplies and clothing to the farmworkers in Watsonville. We have made several club visitations, resulting in closer cooperation with other clubs, particularly San Jose Campbell West and Santa Clara Host clubs. Members' Welfare

Unfortunately, we have had several medical issues during the past year, almost inevitable with an ageing membership. Sadly, Lion Eli's wife and our fellow Lion Mort Eliason passed away since Christmas and this month's celebration is probably the first Charter Night that Lion Eli himself has not attended. Our best wishes go to him and his physiotherapy regime and to all other members and partners receiving medical treatment.

Broadway CHS

DeAnza established a relationship with this school as a result of teachers appealing on Next Door for assistance with providing granola bars for pupils. Apparently, the teachers (as so many do) have been buying these snacks from their own pockets. As a result, our board granted \$500 towards purchase of these supplies, resulting in a visitation from the staff who presented a list of their needs at our PM meeting on 3 January. Since then, Lion Claire has run an appeal on their behalf at 2 Los Gatos schools, which resulted in gifts that completely filled her large SUV. I am planning to establish an annual event in conjunction with Leos and Broadway staff to provide a regular income.

Club Officers and Project Managers

On a less hopeful note, we have recently had problems putting the officers' slate together, which we achieved by the skin of our teeth, thanks to Lions Ray and Dagmar stepping up to President and Secretary respectively. But this still remains an issue for future years. I am aware that most of our long-term members have held office at some time and the PM 40-somethings+ have their hands full with their children's school, sports and leisure activities. However, I trust that members will seriously consider their Club contribution for the following fiscal year starting July 2025.

Membership

In common with many other clubs, we are suffering from a membership issue. Our ideal target demographic is the recently retired group. If

supported by the Board, Lions Kent, Trevor and myself are available to work on this to begin in July. In Closing

For some time now the Cupertino DeAnza Lions Club has been "volunteering", albeit for remuneration, as Santa Clara County Registrar of Voters employees to assist in local elections. By way of explanation, the money comes from the County directly into our 501c7 non-profit social club. The service provided by the DeAnza Lions Club is management of an election materials supply truck, two-person courier vehicles for supplies and two-person courier vehicles for ballot transport.

Is this civic mindedness or just another way to raise money for charity? Our experience is that the employees of the Registrar's Office express deep gratitude and thanks for our involvement. The compensation of fourteen dollars and thirty-seven point five cents (\$14.375) per hour does not seem excessive. Civic mindedness must play a large part

in the minds of the volunteers as well as the Registrar's Office. This civic mindedness just raised over nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00) for administration of our corporations and charity.

The opportunity to do this again will be coming up in October of 2024. We are looking for Club participation. We will have eight-hour shifts, four-hour shifts and AM, PM and evening shifts. Do your part as a Cupertino DeAnza Lion, 8-Noon, 1-5:00PM and 4-8PM. lasting for an eleven-day period that includes a Saturday and Sunday.

This is a great way to raise significant funds through the Registrar of Voters' election process if we can get the Club volunteers or their family and friends to participate. Although these funds are deposited in our 501c7 Social corporation, we have made substantial donations to our Charity 501c3. There will be more about this election time fundraising soon.

Our Garden-Fall/Winter 2023-24 by JChin



Spring has sprung and there is quite a bit of noteworthy news from the DeAnza Lions Garden team at the Camp Via West garden.

After a bumper crop of tomatoes and many other veggies and herbs during the height of summer, Joan and Dagi started to slow down operations for the winter, with only a few crops being planted (like



peas) and seeding ground cover in some beds to improve the quality of the soil. Still, some Collards, Kale and Chard could be harvested frequently, and were accepted by Jen at the Camp kitchen with gratitude.

A silver stripe appeared on the horizon with Alyssa Pecorino coming in as the new director of Camp Via West. In a first meeting at the beginning of December she listened attentively to Joan's long list of requirements, items needed for easier and more productive care for garden and plants, and promised to establish an open channel of communication, taking our requirements into consideration.



The communication channel opened for real in February, when during another meeting Alyssa made note of our top priorities and promised to push for approval and funding with the top guys. Thanks to Joan's meticulously prepared documents and shopping lists, we now have commitments from Via/AbilityPath for

- -the repair of the irrigation system in the garden
- -the installation of a new shed next to the greenhouse (work has already begun)
- -a shade cloth that can be stretched over and removed easily from the garden
- -bird netting to cover the front of the garden
- -a second trellis for training pole tomatoes to grow vertically rather than sideways.

All in all, we are delighted about these developments, which give some incentive to continue growing veggies and herbs for the Campers or WVCS.

Thanks to a mini-greenhouse, an ingenious design by Joan, inside the big greenhouse, we now have hundreds of little plants, some even grown so big that they can be harvested straight from the greenhouse, all others are getting ready to get transplanted into the upgraded garden beds. Another few days of sunshine and moderate warmth, and the garden will brim with veggies and herbs.

With Dagi leaving town again, Joan will take care of the garden operations mostly by herself, but we hope that Alyssa will manage to get some volunteers to assist and help with planting, harvesting and keeping improvements going.

Registrar of Voters (ROV) by LNoone



Each year at election time, October/November and February/March, we are offered the opportunity to volunteer to work for the County Registrar of Voters or ROV. The jobs we are offered vary as do the hours we are asked to work. For compensation, each participant is paid according to the job completed and the payment is deposited in our Charities and our Administrative accounts. The hours available come in shifts—four hours AM, four hours PM or all day, with some exceptions. The event covers eleven days and this includes weekends.

This year we served as ballot carriers, supply couriers, and as the Logistics and Supply Center. With only about 17 Lions and friends of Lions volunteering to support this fundraiser, we were

able to raise more than \$8,000! Every one of our volunteers and members should be proud of the work we completed and of this successful event. We hope you will consider serving when the cycle begins again in October/November.



Ecology Talk and Tips by JChin

Reduce food waste.

Roughly 40 percent of the food we produce in the United States never gets eaten. All this food waste doesn't just mean wasted dollars. It is a huge burden to the environment. If global food waste were a country, it would be the third largest emitter of greenhouse gases – behind China and the United States – because growing, packaging, shipping and storing wasted food takes a lot of energy. Then it starts to rot, creating more gas.

At the same time, one in eight Americans still doesn't have a steady supply of food. This can change. Simply changing the size of your plate, using a smaller refrigerator and planning your meals can make a huge difference in changing your

behavior when it comes to wasted food. That won't only help the planet. It will help your pocketbook.

*Food that you can't use before it goes bad, package and freeze. That will make a future meal easier to put together.

*Food that you won't use, please find a way to donate it. Groceries that are perishable, as well as packaged to last, are always welcome at West Valley Community Services. Even extra fruit from your trees can go to good use.

*Food that no one should eat can be composted, which is much better added to a garden or as a mulch on any plants in your yard. There are indoor clean ways to compost if your waste service doesn't take it for composting.
