De Anza Dollars by AKnox, Club Treasurer

DeAnza Dollars are always in the hands of the Board of Directors and the Club Treasurer. The Directors change every two years or in some cases more often. Not so much for the Club Treasurer. The Treasurer has been in office since April of 2019 and before that, from July of 2007 to July of 2015. That is a total of fourteen years. Before July of 2007, the Treasurer was President for two years and moved from Club Secretary to that position. LCI has no record of the Treasurer's service prior to 2004. That entails an additional twenty-three years of service.

The point here is that the Treasurer is resigning soon. This means there is an opportunity for a DeAnza Lion, friend of DeAnza Lion, a recruited new Lion member, to assume those responsibilities. The responsibility will be custody of all DeAnza Funds currently in the California Bank and Trust, Cupertino branch. Two corporate accounts exist, Cupertino DeAnza Lions Club (501C7) and Cupertino DeAnza Lions Charities, Inc. (501C3). Data entry, reconciliations, quarterly reports to the Board and membership, and a position as an Officer and member of the Board of Directors are required. We are told that a current Lion is willing to perform the annual reports to the Internal Revenue Service, Franchise Tax Board, Attorney General and Secretary of State.

The foregoing is not the only solution, accounting clerks are available for hire and a CPA firm for reporting. This could result in a necessary increase in our current annual dues. The office position of Treasurer on the Board would be maintained for oversight. This might be a golden opportunity for a retired professional to contribute significantly to a charitable corporation or even a way for a student or intern to develop complete accounting and reporting skills. The current Treasurer, though resigning from the position, is remaining a member and available to assist in any manner possible.

The Club Treasurer would like to express herein his sincere gratitude and appreciation of all members during his years of service. Truly, he has been here, not because of the money, but because the members have always made it difficult to be associated with Lions anywhere else.

Garden Report-Midsummer 2024 by JChin

Summer Solstice is just behind us and the 4th of July is around the corner—time to look back at some positive developments at the Garden and Greenhouse at Camp Via West.

Most of the commitments made by Via/AbilityPath at the beginning of the year have materialized:

- The irrigation system in the garden was repaired by an expert Joan had invited to come out

- A new shed next to the greenhouse was built-a bit smaller than the old one, but very useful and convenient nevertheless

- Shade cloth was provided for the greenhouse (pulled over into place by Lions Chris and Jeff, plus Rich Lordan)

- A second trellis for training pole tomatoes to grow vertically rather than sideways was purchased and installed by camp workers

The shade cloth covering the garden was installed by Jeff, Chris and Joan, who used existing pieces and new ones to fit like puzzle pieces across the garden and clamped them together so they would not be moved by strong winds. Working conditions in both garden and greenhouse have markedly improved, especially when the temps are going up.

Less positive is the lack of tangible efforts from VIA/AbilityPath management to assign responsibility and management of the garden to one of theirs, however, there are more groups of camp assistants getting interested in introducing some campers to gardening. Also, Tessellations school seems to be keen on having teachers and students out, using the ground level bed for some educational projects—while it should be the Camp's job to do, Joan has spent her time giving them instructions and support in getting started.

Courtney's group of 5 disabled adult men have been coming regularly each Friday for over a year now and have contributed quite nicely to the maintenance of the garden. Joan also enlisted a friend of hers, Jane, herself an avid gardener, to assist with harvest and watering, while Carol still comes occasionally during her move.

Dagi has been back for many weeks now and is doing the essential harvests of greens and herbs, plus using her special skills in planting needed summer crops and flowers. Jen, the chef in the Camp kitchen, has taken quite a lot of the produce, but we still deliver quite a bit, also, to WVCS. Joan has been planting a good number of tomato plants and is applying newly learned techniques, hopeful to ensure we have a respectable harvest come August and September.

Installation of Officers/DeAnza College Leos



The Cupertino De Anza Lions formally inducted charter members and officers of the new De Anza College Leos Club the evening of Tuesday, June 4th at the Odd Fellows Hall. The inspiring event was attended by ten De Anza Lions, District Governor Benji Fernandez, First Vice Governor Stan Weitzman and District 4-C6 Leo Chair and past-DG Thelma Batilo.

In his remarks, Leo Advisor Kent Vincent described the new club as impressive, a great partner, as having great leadership and having hit the ground running. The club was officially chartered by LCI with 26 members, including 7 officers, within three weeks of their requesting our sponsorship in mid-November. A month later the club grew to 40 members. The new Leos provided stellar full table service at our crab feed and earned \$3K in the club's first fund-raiser, volunteering for ROV. 4C-6 Leo Chair Thelma Batilo inducted Leo President Maggie Ruslie, VP Jarrell Taslim, Secretary Tiffelyn Kurniawan, next year's Secretary Kassem Lim as well as nine other charter members who were able to attend. The founding officers signed the Certificate of Organization and the attending Lions collectively pinned the new Leos.



The graduating charter officers all attained 4.0+ GPAs at De Anza College and will transfer to USC, UC Berkeley, UCLA and UC San Diego in the fall. Leo President Maggie Ruslie believes their chartering the new Leo club was instrumental in acceptance to these very excellent universities. The De Anza College Leo Club is the only Omega (college) Leo club in the district.

Lions Vision Clinic by JSmith

Lions District 4-C6 held their 4th Vision Clinic on Sunday, June 9th at Community Services in Sunnyvale, Northern California.



A total of 361 patients attended, most of whom received eye examinations and re-cycled glasses. Patients attended from 12 cities within a radius of 60 miles.



Dr. Art Low and his team of 6 optometrists volunteered their services on the day. Over 60 Lions from 16 clubs helped to put on the clinic.



Guest volunteers included Lions from Districts 4-C2 and 4-C4, 4 opticians, nurses and translators from RotaCare, a member of Sunnyvale Rotary Club, Boy Scouts Troop 13, Girls Scouts, a member of Stanford Medical Alumni Association, City of Sunnyvale Sustainability Commissioner, students from East Palo Alto Academy, friends and families.

We have one new member in our District who came as a patient, stayed with us as a volunteer/translator, and now she is joining Lions what a way of paying back!

There were 15 referrals/potential patients of LEF.



DeAnza Lions Lost a Member of Our Pride In Memoriam – Bill Reed

We recently lost a highly-respected, most-valued and the eldest member of our Lions family. I asked our AM meeting attendees to remain at the IHOP after our meeting and to be prepared to talk about Bill. I recorded their stories and now, please meet Bill. Stories of him came easily with *this* crowd.



Bill was born when Calvin Coolidge was President. He grew up in the Bay Area and went to Fremont High School. He was in the service and attended college on the GI Bill after the war. He was married to Jane and they had two sons. Bill was a special man who joined the Cupertino DeAnza Lions Club in August 1991, a member of 32+ years.



Bill was a man of few words. While he was Treasurer, when you asked him anything about the accounts, you received a one- or two-word answer—"as though he was from the state of Maine". Bill was Treasurer when Eli was President— Eli says he never received a financial statement from Bill during that time but when he asked Bill about the accounts, he always replied, "Eli, we have checks," who could worry? Bill left the office so he could spend more time at Camp Costanoan (now Camp Via). He was considered a good Board member who never missed a meeting. And as a member of the Club, he was one member who was never in arrears of any accounts; this is a blessing for any Treasurer. He will always be remembered for his dedication; if there was a Lions event, we never had to ask him to help, he was already there!



Bill built all of the houses he and the family lived in and did all of the work except for electrical and concrete. He did a lot of carpentry work like cutting pieces of wood and then climbing with them three stories up then leaning out the window to nail the joists in place while building houses with the Lions for Habitat for Humanity.



As predicted, most of the stories that were told took place at The Camp. You have probably (often!) heard some of these stories but sharing is giving and I hope these give you a treat. It was strongly stated that if anything took place at the Camp, Bill had something to do with it.

Long about 30 years ago, there was a time when Bill and Eli were assigned the duties of cleaning up the area around the waterwheel building and then painting that building. They took care of the cleanup, it looked pretty good so they went to the paint shed and were told they could use any paint they wanted and they suggested that the Lions use "those cans of brown paint over there". Bill and Eli took the cans and went off to paint the waterwheel. As they worked, the paint went on as a good brown but after it dried it was bright pink! Eli made sure he was known as the apprentice and that Bill was the contractor. Bill took a lot of heat over that waterwheel and guess who grinned like a Cheshire cat! Several remember painting with Bill all around Camp, the amphitheater, cabins, logs, everywhere that needed paint. No one used pink paint but they went all over Camp with brushes and cans in hand.



Several more Lions met Bill at the Camp and he left a lasting first impression with all of them. Bill, et al, were building a fence at Camp and it was clear that he was in charge. He was way up on the ladder while a crew of young guys were on the ground. He was obviously the one who should *not* have been up there but under his direction, the fence was built quickly. He always made everybody feel welcome with that smile of his. We met at Camp when he was working with a crew of 6 or 7, and I was amazed at how strong that man was. So, when his wife had to be in a wheelchair, he was pushing her everywhere. Bill is an inspiration to all of us older people. He was



so welcoming and amazing, he was probably in his late 80's and there he was out-working everyone, carrying 4x4 posts, getting it all done. Bill was one great person and he was instrumental in building the bridge near the amphitheater. He got a design and made that bridge go up. Once in the spring 2020, he was doing clean-up with Lions near the cabins adjacent to the garden area. He was pushing a lawn mower along the hillside, who does that?



He insisted on working for us whenever we worked for ROV, just to be a part of it. He worked 8-hour shifts each session until February/March2024.

Bill didn't only work up at The Camp! He was very involved with the Thanksgiving Food Drive. He'd worked the food drive as long as any could remember, asking for donations outside of the food stores. Even during the pandemic, he was there. He also drove to the stores to pick up food to deliver it to the Odd Fellows Lodge. If you rode with Bill you learned that he'd drive every road or freeway at 25 mph. No matter what. You'd ride along wondering if you would ever get to where you're going. Every year he would then use his truck to deliver excess turkeys and food to Sunnyvale community center.



If you are a part of the DeAnza Lions, you will be sharing some personal things with us as time goes by. One meeting, Bill, in a very calm voice told us that he had had to take Jane to an assisted care facility because he couldn't handle it any longer. Sometime later at the end of an AM meeting, he stood very somberly and told us that his Jane had passed away. It was so sad but so noble. Such a noble man at this devastating time.

Bill was adamant that he would attend our AM meetings until January '24 and he had to rely upon his son Patrick to get him there. He'd have a little breakfast, listen to the meeting and the chatter and then wait for Patrick to pick him up. One morning he reached in his wallet to discover he had no cash. Barb spoke up and said it was their treat. Sure enough, the following week Bill and Patrick came in and Patrick was holding a \$20 bill for Barb. There was no way Bill would have allowed Patrick to forget that somebody had paid for his breakfast.



There is one last great tail to tell. Ray drove Bill to the California Lions MD4 convention 2009 in Fresno. He received the Lion District Project of the Year Award for all of his work at Camp Costanoan from the LCI president. What an honor.

As we finished our stories, we reflected on the man who had lived a life we all hoped we are living. I want to be like him when I grow up.
