President's Post President Ray's report to the CDAL ROV - the Club was very successful in raising about \$13,200 volunteering for the Registrar of Voters. We had more than a dozen Lions and friends of Lions who worked multiple shifts from October 26th to November 5th. Lions Al and Barb opened their house and backyard to be a distribution center with the ROV truck parked in the yard for the whole time and having the volunteers sit in their home for days. Prior to the event, the ROV staff held a training session for all the volunteers also at the Knox ho bme. This event has become a major fundraiser for our Club and someone must step up to have the event at their home next election. This is a good fundraiser for now but down the road it will go away due to all mail in ballots. So please think short-term to support this activity and think of new ways to raise funds for our charities in the long run. Fourteen volunteers accomplished a lot and logged in many service hours, making the election run smoothly while all the time raising money for January/April 2025

the Club's charities. Like everything "The Times Are Changing" and we have to adapt as Lions.

The Food Drive was very successful as we were able to provide two boxes of food to all the families in need at our chosen locations. Thanks Lion Jeff and all the Lions that stepped up and adjusted on the fly to the last-minute cancellation of the refrigerator truck due to mechanical issues. Lion Jeff drove his car to South San Francisco to pick up dried ice on the Saturday morning of the food drive and returned with the smoke coming from the ice blowing out his windows. They had to put blankets on the ice to keep it from melting too fast. The ice was put in a regular rental truck that we substituted for the refrigerator truck to keep the perishables, milk, eggs, butter and turkeys cold. Charles Ice was a perfect organizer as shown on the video taken by 2VDG of our food drive. Many Lions and friends of Lions stepped up to make this happen again after 40-plus years. We packed and delivered 2 boxes of food to 177 families or 354 boxes of food to families that are food insecure. We had volunteers from two high schools join us. Thanks to Lion Don Lang for making the Odd Fellows Lodge available to make this all possible. This has been a Lions tradition for 45 years.

The Lions Annual Golf Tournament 2025 fundraiser has been cancelled. There were a number of things leading up to this difficult decision. Due to our inability to get enough golfers, the amount of effort it takes to stage this event *versus* the money that was raised from the last tournament, showed that the earnings were not sufficient enough to warrant the effort this year, and no one has stepped up to take over the leadership of the fundraiser. But if some Lion or friends of Lions want to lead and pursue this event in the future, we are open to the idea. It has been very difficult to hold tournaments on the weekends as the courses will not allow shotgun starts on Saturday or Sunday. It is imperative for the Club to come up with a new fundraiser idea that will enable our Club to meet the community needs we are committed to helping.

Our Club constantly changes with new members charting new paths but the common thread is "WE SERVE". New folks and new projects to help those in need bring us all together to serve. Remember, if we don't change, we perish.

I ask all of you to wear your Lions pin all day one day a week. People will ask what the pin stands for and this will open up a conversation about Lions and what we do.

Thoughts on the DeAnza Lions Future



Fellow Lions,

After running the four-month gauntlet of Lions' activities from Omar's Dream Run in mid-October, ROV in October/November, the Thanksgiving Food Drive at the end of November, the Christmas Party {canceled this year}, the Annual Crab Feed in January/February to the Student Speaker Contest in mid-February and then remembering that there are also three school vacations mixed in there, I believe that we need to look at how we schedule our events and if our current schedule might negatively impact Club participation.

There are three holiday breaks during that fourmonth period: Thanksgiving, Christmas/semester break and winter break. These are times when families tend to have visitors or leave the area. This takes away from our "Younger Lions" labor pool. In other words, we have 4 of our all-hands-on-deck activities (ROV, Food Drive, Christmas Party and Crab Feed) scheduled just when people tend to be unavailable. We also have the speech contest in February, which requires about 10 Lions Club members. Cupertino DeAnza Lions are asking for everyone in the Club (along with family & friends) to participate in these activities when we need them most but when they are most likely to be busy elsewhere. In short, we are asking for way too much Club participation over that extremely short time period.

In the upcoming months we have a Charter Night, Earth Day and Project Linus to manage and perhaps 1 or 2 more activities. This is quite a different schedule than what has been described above. *I propose that*



- we have the Board meet and set up a yearly calendar that spreads out our all-hands-on-deck activities.
- we also need to make a better effort at motivating all members to attend our monthly meetings. Maybe we should cancel the AM meetings on the first Thursday of every month to encourage everyone to attend the PM meeting the night before.
- finally, we need to encourage our non-attending members to sign up to take on new challenges. There are currently openings for President, First VP, Treasurer, Secretary, Directors, Lions Roar Editor, Golf Tournament Chair, Student Speaker Contest Chair and more. Any Volunteers?

■ Please note: during the AM meeting on 3/20, members decided to see if the Club might have more attend the PM meeting if the AM meeting the next day was optional, not a scheduled meeting day. April 3 will be an optional meeting and a one-time experiment.

The Student Speaker Contest by LNoone

The DeAnza Lions Club-level contest was held in mid-February. It was the Multiple District 4's 88th annual Student Speaker Contest. The subject was "Artificial Intelligence (AI): Friend or Foe". We contacted all of Cupertino's high schools, as well as, two private schools in the area sending them the DAL flyer announcing the contest. It was quite a job getting students to reply to our announcement but in the end, we did have several students expressing an interest in joining us to compete.



The two Student Speakers came ready to let us know their thoughts on the subject! It was such a surprise hearing their very different points of view. Each speaker was very animated, choosing to speak from the floor of the auditorium rather than standing on a raised stage behind a large podium. Their speeches had to be between 5-10 minutes long and there were three Timers there to make sure they followed the rules.



There were also four Judges who completed a score sheet during each speech. Then there were three Tellers who gathered outside the auditorium to make sure all tally sheets from the Judges and Timers were completed with no mistakes. From there they did their job using all of the gathered information to determine who was the Winner of the Contest. Each Student Speaker received \$25.00 as a participation reward. The Winner, Ashley, won an additional \$100.00 and an invitation to attend the next competition at the Zone level. The rewards are higher as each Speaker moves up the scale.



Our audience and volunteers enjoyed the event itself and especially meeting our contestants. It was very competitive but, as always, an enjoyable event.

Lion Leslye did a good historical presentation of Project Linus which she has led for years. These blankets have a major impact on the children receiving them in hospitals and several places throughout the local area.



Lion Jeff did a good job telling us how the Lions stepped up and improvised in order to pull off another Thanksgiving Food drive that fed 177+ families. I think he said we have been doing this event for nearly 50 years!



Lion Ray gave a presentation, prepared by Lion Claire, about our year-round work with the Farm Workers. We are providing children's clothes, toiletries and kitchenware to those families. Let's keep it up; you can give Lion Ray any items and he will make sure they get delivered to Watsonville.



We are also providing snacks to the Broadway High School to help students get their diplomas. Some are homeless, some have children and they all need the additional energy to concentrate.



DG Jolley gave a talk and slide show on the cause of the LA fires and what we can do to keep ourselves and families safe in emergencies. With his background as a battalion chief for Cal Fire, he brings a lot of first-hand knowledge to Lions of MD 4. The fires spread so fast in LA that many things could not be done by homeowners who were fleeing for their lives. We have all been taught to shut off our gas lines in any emergency but I never knew to turn off your water main, also. The fire melted everything and from every faucet, bath, etc., water was flowing from these outlets which were unchecked for hundreds or thousands of homes in LA. Remember to have an emergency plan to evacuate if necessary. Have a battery pack to charge your phone. You can get more information from Cal Fire and Lions MD 4.



The Paradise Fire victims have only rebuilt 16% of the homes that were lost 6 years ago. God knows how long it will take to rebuild in LA. Folks in Altadena have lived there for over 50 years and will not be able to return or rebuild. Very unfortunate when you lose your home and your community in a few days.

The Lions have committed money and will be there for years to come for support; just like we are still in Haiti. We are in it for the long haul.

That instilled a deep sense of community and service in me plus ours is such a family-friendly group. We are doing the same with our kids, and I think at least 2 out of 3 of them are following our example.
